This Grand Jury evaluated and analyzed each Bill of Indictment presented, without bias or prejudice, before reaching their decisions. By law, a quorum of 16 Grand Jury members must be present to vote on an indictment. Issuing a True Bill indictment further requires a minimum of 12-panel mem-

Many of the grand jurors, if not all, were stunned to learn that recruitment for joining these gangs has infiltrated all of our nas inflittated all of our schools not just in our county but statewide and down to the elementary level. This grand jury would like to make a plea to our officials to continue educating the public, children, teenagers and parents alike of the dan-gers associated with gang activity and recrnitment and inform parents of the warning signs of their child/chiling signs of their child/chil-dren potentially being in-volved in gang activity. Our plea includes implementing programs, if they don't al-ready exist, to protect mi-nors from intimidation and manipulation by using the school structure to do so, something similar to a "safe

2.) Immigration Task Force-We heard more than our fair share of cases that involved the abuse and exploitation of children and women. In many of these cases, the many of these cases, the victims or the victims' parent were in the US illegally. These victims are often helpless due to cultural and language barriers, have an inability to access resomes and are simply too scared to seek help thus allowing the cycle of abuse to continue. It is the recommendation of this grand jury to implement a task force that employs a multilingual staff who have an understanding of the linan understanding of the inf-guistic and cultural barriers to help and protect some of the most vulnerable and marginalized populations of om community especially the under-aged.

3.) Code Enforcement -Currently Gwinnett County will only take code enforcement for exterior conditions That's because there is no supporting municipal code for interior conditions. Some municipalities do have some code enforcement in place but there is NO county wide municipal code for interior conditions. It is the sugges-tion of this grand jury that the Gwinnett County Com-mission review this policy Name and signature of make necessaiv changes to require landlords to maintain appropriate liv-ing conditions, including in-spections of the exterior of

buildings but also the interiors. 4.) GCJA Building Cafeteria

Over the last six months, as a grand jury we have experienced lunch breaks from 30 minutes to just over an hour which often proved not enough time to leave the GCJA campus to grab a bite to eat. Therefore many of us would bring our lunches or dine at the GCJA cafeteria Currently, the food is orpayment is made thru a sec-ond kiosk which tends to bottleneck making it realisti cally difficult to purchase and obtain food in time to return to the jury and grand jury rooms. It is the recommendation of this grand jury that an app and/or service be implemented to allow for ordering and paying by pa-trons to avoid the pay kiosks. With today's technol-ogy there is no technical reason not to have this ability which will help serve more which will help serve more efficiently. Furthermore customers can order before they even get down to the cafeteria which can cut down wait times and tardi-

ness from lunch break. 5.) Some additional recommendations - Implement a system to replace "repeat of-fenders" related to absenteeism. Too often we found ourselves within the minimum limit required for grand jury sessions. Also mentioned was increasing the daily pay of \$30 to help inconting these that work
